

Exhibit Life In Abstract

After crossing Brooklyn Bridge a student who went sightseeing in New York City was eager to explore new parts of the city. When she got to City Hall Park, she was excited to find sculptures displayed as a part of an open exhibit.

Life in the Abstract is open between June 8, 2022 and February 26, 2023. The pieces presented in the exhibit are three-dimensional models of everyday objects, human body parts and abstract shapes. The sculptures are made out of steel, have brown appearances and are slightly taller than the average person.





The three-dimensional art exhibition, Life in the Abstract is one of the current public art exhibitions located at the heart of the city, in City Hall Park, a park located in Downtown, Manhattan. Visitors are welcome to visit this limited exhibition by Wyatt Kahn, a sculpture artist whose works are

However, these objects are present in Wyatt Kahn's previous works. The shapes, which follow the same abstract qualities, can be found in Kahn's canvas drawings.

"Painter the Painter" made in 2021, is one of the sculptures exhibited as a part of Life in the Abstract. The abstract figure is situated right across the fountain in the middle.

"The sculptures are very meaningful and they represent our daily life," said Celine, the sightseeing student.

"They're fun to look at because seeing objects we are used to on bigger scales is unusual," said Celine.

A description of Life in the Abstract and of the artist Wyatt Kahn is placed at the entrance. Therefore, people can obtain information or learn about the ongoing exhibit...




"I am not really familiar with abstract art. The sign was helpful," said Celine.

HEALTHY CHOCOLATE BROWNIES

- 2 x 400g cans black beans, drained, rinsed and drained again
- 60g cocoa powder
- 1 tbsp instant coffee granules
- 200g xylitol
- 1 tbsp vanilla extract or vanilla bean paste
- 3 eggs
- 200g fat-free yogurt
- 1½ tsp gluten-free baking powder



Method

STEP 1

Heat the oven to 190C/170C fan/gas 5 and line a shallow 23cm square baking tin with baking parchment. Tip the beans, cocoa, coffee granules, xylitol, vanilla, eggs and yogurt into a large bowl. Blitz using a hand blender until smooth. Or, do this in a food processor. Add the baking powder, then blitz again.



 Quickly tip the mixture into the tin and bake for 25-30 mins until set. Leave to cool in the tin for a few minutes, then lift out onto a wire rack to cool completely. Remove the baking parchment, then cut into 16 squares. Will keep chilled for up to three days.

New York City is a culturally blended city which presents New Yorkers and visitors with cuisines from all around the world. Turkish food is included in this delicious international food cuisine with dishes such as döner, kebap, manti, sütlaç, cacık, baklava and iskender.

Located all around Manhattan. restaurants which offer a variety Turkish food are active in Kitchen. Hell's neighborhood in Midtown, Manhattan, well. as Containing eight the of Turkish restaurants in Manhattan, Hell's Kitchen is surely a great neighborhood for tasting amazing Turkish meals.







ISTANBUL BAY

Istanbul Bay, located at 578 Ninth Ave is a restaurant chain, which classic Turkish serves dishes as fast food. The menu, comprehensive, being not SO consists of entrées, main courses and desserts. Their most selling anything items with are döner(gyro).

"Our döners are like the ones made in Europe, but they're different from Turkey," said Yusuf, an employee at İstanbul Bay who is from Hatay.

Nonetheless, their döners were much like the ones in Turkey, except the large amounts of oil. The lamb döner meal is served with a standard salad, pide(pita) and Pilav, a Turkish dish made with rice. Little packets of hot sauce and cacık, a side dish made from yogurt, cucumbers and mint.

Prices weren't high on average and the meals were big enough. The smallest portion is the same as the middle one in Turkey!

"All of the products are from our own farms," said Yusuf.

"It's as delicious as the one in Turkey," said Sibel, a tourist from Turkey.

İstanbul Bay has one location in Manhattan and three in Brooklyn.

TURKISH CUISINE

Turkish Cuisine, located at 631 Ninth Ave is a small restaurant which has been operating for the last twenty-five years. In addition to selling well-known food like döner, it has a wide selection of home-cooked dishes as well.

"Generally, Turkish dishes are made just like in Turkey," said Ayten, the co-manager of the restaurant who's from Samsun. Turkish Cuisine's best feature is the internal decorations which resemble a household from the late 19th century Ottoman Empire. The walls are decorated with Mevlana(Rumi) figures covered in Çini, a ceramic art from Turkish culture. Figurines of all of the Ottoman sultans and their wives.

"Many of our ingredients are from New York, except drinks like Ayran which are shipped from Turkey," said Ayten.

A downside of Turkish Cuisine is the prices. They are much more expensive than other Turkish restaurants located in Hell's Kitchen.

""The decor represents Turkish cuisines," said Sibel.





TURCO MEDITARRENEAN GRILLL

Turco Mediterranean Grill is a small fast food restaurant located at 604 Ninth Ave. The menu has many different options for entrées, side dishes, desserts and drinks. It resembles traditional restaurants known as ASPAVA in Turkey.

The staff has approximately 6 members with a few Turks. Compared to other restaurants, the employees are much more cold and distant.

An upside of Turco Mediterranean Grill is their fast service. Despite having to make multiple orders at the same time, they're able to complete each of them in under three minutes.

Additionally, the menu is displayed above for customers to see. Therefore, seeing all the options is easy.

"The drinks are canned sodas and ayran which were imported from Turkey," said Sibel.

Turco Mediterranean Grill is a Turkish restaurant which has embraced the American fast-food model.

The origins of anime may be back the to traced twentieth century, with the first confirmed films appearing around 1907. Before the invention of film, Japan already long history including entertainment, utsushi-e, a special Japanese style of magic lantern show that was very well-liked in the 19th which century, featured colorfully painted characters moving over the projection

In 1900's, the early animes that are made were mostly done by chalk&board drawing and paper drawings with stopmotion since the technology wasn't developed enough. The "fathers" of anime, Ten Shimokawa, Jun'ichi Kuchi, and Seitaro Kitayama, were among the second generation of animators working in the late 1910s. With the help of Disney animators, anime grew further during the 1970s, breaking away from its origins in Western culture and creating new genres like mecha and its super robot The typical subgenre. television programs from this era are Astro Boy, Lupin III, and Mazinger Z. Several filmmakers rose to fame during this time, most notably Hayao Miyazaki and Mamoru Oshii.




Most people think that the first anime ever was Astro Boy, however the earliest known animated 'thing' from Japan is Katsud Shashin, which thought to have been made in 1907. 活動写真(Katsudo Shashin) is literally translated as "action photograph." After being contacted by a usedvideo trader. Natsuki Matsumoto, an iconography expert at the Osaka University of Arts, found the movie in Kyoto in 2005. It consists of fifty frames stencilled directly onto a strip of celluloid. This little animation is about a sailor bov writing something japanese on a board. There's no theme or anything, just a 50 framed animation of a sailor boy. Since it's super old the original of the animation has pictures that are mostly pixaleted and blurry. It has been tried to restored to make it more understandable.




The Dull Sword is a 1917 Japanese animated short film directed by Jun'ichi Kuchi. Its Japanese title is, Hepburn: Namakura Gatana. In March 2008, an employee of an store in antique Osaka rediscovered it. This 4-minute silent short relates the tale of a naive rinin who buys a dulledged sword and then tries to perform tsujigiri. It was published on June 30, 1917, making it one of the very first animes. In the short comedy jidaigeki Namakura Gatana (lit. "dull-edged sword"; gatana is the rendaku of the katana), a dimwitted self-styled samurai and his worn-down sword, becomes entirely which worthless as he attempts to battle even the weakest opponents, are the main The characters. samurai attempts hard to assault random townspeople who fight themselves and knock him down while he tries to figure out why his old sword cannot cut

anyone he strikes.

Due to anime's enhanced accessibility on streaming platforms during the COVID-19 epidemic, its popularity and demand significantly expanded on a global scale. The highest-grossing Japanese film of 2020 and the highest-grossing movie in the entire world is Demon Slayer: Kimetsu Mugen Train. no Yaiba the Movie: Additionally, because it earned 10 billion yen in just 10 days, it became the movie with the quickest Japanese grossing history. Spirited Away's 25-day record was beaten by this one. The anime versions of Tokyo Revengers, Demon Slayer: Kimetsu no Yaiba, and Jujutsu Kaisen were among the top 10 TV shows discussed on Twitter globally in 2021. As we can see the animation quality is way more vivid and understandable than the first two animes that ever existed. The animation, colours are more vibrant. Even 3D models are started to be used in latest animes too, like Chainsaw Man and Attack on Titan season 4. History of anime has come a long way and it's still improving as the days pass. It's surprising to see that these little bits of animation -Katsudo Shashin. The Dull Sword- evolved into

Among them there are book stores which have wide selections of comic books from various different writers and illustrators are well-known. Others are waiting for their comic book sections to be discovered.

Nonetheless, it's an opportunity for fans to visit local stores and brands to find their favorite series.





Forbidden Planet

Forbidden Planet is one of the older comic book stores located on 832 Broadway, near Union Square. It sells comic books, merchandise, movies and other goods relating to numerous comic series. They have a wide selection of different series and English translations of comic books from all around the world.

"An excellent array of geekery, from horror to wrestling merchandise and memorabilia. I also can't ever leave here empty handed, you can always find something cool." Santina B. said.

In addition to the serialized volumes, Forbidden Planet offers a variety of weekly and monthly issues as well. They have the latest issue of many popular series. First issues of several series are also displayed for fans who want to begin reading one.

The prices vary for different publishers and series. Volumes generally cost between \$9 - \$30 which is the average price depending on the book. Timely issues range between \$1-\$6. Therefore, the prices are average.

"Everyone in the store is kind, knowledgeable, and generous in sharing their time, interest, and expertise in helping me find just what I need." Andrea S., a teacher, said.

Forbidden Planet sells merchandise like figures, t-shirts and key-chains too.

The store has a section of comic books for children as well.

Strand Book Store

Strand Book Store is an independently owned bookseller established in 1927. It has 5 locations in Manhattan, including the one on 828 Broadway. Their selection of books is wide. Lots of different genres, textbooks and comics. Strand Book Store sells second-hand books and comics as well.

"We come here each time we are in Manhattan to shop for books, both new and used. It is a very big and historic store and worth your patronage." said Thomas V, from Oakland, California.

Strand Book Store's comic section isn't as inclusive as Forbidden Planet. However, they do have popular series and latest publications. But Strand Book Store's best aspect is second-hand comics.


Most of the second-hand comics are in near-pristine condition. Some timely issues still have their protective packaging. It is an opportunity to find older comics published years ago.

The prices of second-hand are at least 50% lower than the originals. Volumes range between \$5 - \$8 while weekly issues range between \$1- \$2.50.

"This is a gem of a store. It is also huge and you can easily become overwhelmed looking for anything specific." a customer said.

Strand Book Store buys second-hand books of any genre between Thursdays and Saturdays.





Barnes & Noble

Barnes & Noble is a book store brand. One of its stores is located on 33 E 17th St, near Union Square. The building is 4 stories and has a very wide selection of books, magazines, newspapers and comics.

Most of the 4th floor is reserved for comic books.

"This is a must-visit if you are in NYC - there aren't many bookstores like this around anymore," Chuck K. said.

Many customers read books while sitting on the ground, on the 4th floor. This mainly happens during the middle of the day, when the store is at its busiest. This can be a way of sampling a new series. But customers should not forget to purchase.

"Many friendly, knowledgeable staff. Good children's section," Gajtana S. said.








THIS YOUNG MAN WAS NOTICED BY A LOCAL GARBAGE COMPANY WHEN HE WAS IN THE NINTH GRADE AFTER WINNING A PRIZE FOR AN ANTI-LITTER POSTER HE DESIGNED. THE COMPANY PLACED THIS POSTER ON ALL OF ITS GARBAGE TRUCKS FOR A YEAR. AFTER GRADUATING FROM HIGH SCHOOL, THIS TALENTED YOUNG BOY ATTENDED THE CALIFORNIA INSTITUTE OF THE ART TO STUDY CHARACTER ANIMATION THEN HE STARTED TO WORK AT DISNEY.





HE WORKED AS AN ANIMATOR, STORYBOARD ARTIST, GRAPHIC DESIGNER, ART DIRECTOR, AND CONCEPT ARTIST ON FILMS SUCH AS THE FOX AND THE HOUND (1981), TRON (1982), AND THE BLACK CAULDRON (1985) BUT HIS COLLEAGUES DIDN'T AGREE WITH HIM AND NONE OF HIS WORK TOOK PLACE IN THE MOVIES. HOWEVER, DISNEY DIDN'T GIVE UP ON HIM AND BURTON MADE HIS FIRST SHORT IN DISNEY, 1982 "VINCENT" A SIX-MINUTE BLACK-AND-WHITE STOP-MOTION FILM BASED ON A POEM WRITTEN BY BURTON, WHICH DEPICTS A YOUNG BOY WHO FANTASIZES THAT HE IS HIS HERO VINCENT PRICE, WITH PRICE HIMSELF PROVIDING NARRATION WHICH WON MANY AWARDS.

Burton's next live-action short film, Frankenweenie tells the story of a young boy who tries to revive his dog after it is run over by a car and was labeled as "inappropriate" for children and Disney fired Burton. But there was someone, someone who understood Burton, who had faith in Burton; Paul Reubens.




After seeing Frankenweenie, Reubens thought that Burton was the right person to direct him in his first full-length feature film, Pee-wee's Big Adventure (1985). The film was a surprise success, and Burton instantly became popular. People offered him many scripts but they were just spin-offs of the film, This was enough for Burton to prove himself to the World, but not enough for young Burton who had many more ideas, he wanted to do something new.

Until he was presented with the script OF BEETLEJUICE HE DID NOTHING FOR THE NEXT THREE YEARS. THIS FILM WAS NOTHING BUT ANOTHER CHANCE FOR BURTON TO ACHIEVE SUCCESS AND PROVE HIMSELF ONE MORE TIME. THEN WARNER BROS ENTRUSTED HIM WITH THE POPULAR COMIC BOOK SERIES. THE ONE, AND ONLY BATMAN, STARRING MICHAEL KEATON AND JACK NICHOLSON, THE FILM WAS THE MOST FINANCIALLY SUCCESSFUL FILM OF THE YEAR AND BURTON'S BIGGEST BOX-OFFICE HIT TO DATE. AFTER THREE FANTASTIC FILMS, BURTON WAS GIVEN THE GREEN LIGHT TO MAKE HIS NEXT FILM, ANY KIND OF FILM HE WANTED WHICH LEAD HIM TO DO EDWARD SCISSORHANDS WHICH IS ONE OF HIS MOST EMOTIONAL, ARTISTIC MOVIES, ALSO THE FIRST MOVIE WITH ACTOR JOHNNY DEPP.



AFTER SCISSORHANDS, HE RELEASED THE SECOND BATMAN MOVIE, BATMAN RETURNS IN 1992. DESPITE THE SUCCESS OF THE FIRST ONE, THIS MOVIE WAS NOTHING BUT A FLOP, AND MANY PEOPLE WERE DISAPPOINTED BY IT. WHILE WORKING ON BATMAN RETURNS, HE WAS ALSO WORKING ON THE NIGHTMARE BEFORE CHRISTMAS, A MUSICAL ANIMATION THAT ACHIEVED MASSIVE SUCCESS. THEN HE RELEASE ED WOOD IN 1994, AND MARS ATTACKS IN 1996 WHICH WASN'T AS DARK AS HIS OTHER PROJECTS.





AFTER THAT, BURTON RETURNED TO HIS DARKER AND MORE ARTISTIC FORM WITH SLEEPY HOLLOW IN 1999 STARRING JOHNNY DEPP, CHRISTINA RICCI, AND CASPER VAN DIEN. AFTER THE DISAPPOINTMENT FELT BY MARS ATTACKS, THIS FILM WAS A CHANCE FOR BURTON TO PROVE THAT HE STILL HAD "IT" AND HE WOULD ALWAYS HAVE. THE MOVIE WAS PRAISED FOR ITS ART DIRECTION AND WAS FINANCIALLY SUCCESSFUL.


AFTER OTHER PROJECTS, BURTON RELEASED ANOTHER MUSICAL-ANIMATION MOVIE CALLED "CORPSE BRIDE" AND THE MUSICAL ADVENTURE FILM CHARLIE AND THE CHOCOLATE FACTORY, WHICH JOHNNY DEPP AND HELENA BONHAM CARTER TOOK PLACE, IN 2005. HE RELEASED ALICE IN WONDERLAND IN 2010 STARRING HELENA BONHAM CARTER AND JOHNNY DEPP.



AFTER MANY MORE SUCCESSFUL MOVIES, HIS LATEST PROJECT IS THE NETFLIX SERIES Wednesday starring Jenna Ortega which is a sequence to The Addams Familly. BRUTALISM IN FILM

Bulky, blocky, and boxy, brutalist architecture remains the most controversial architectural style. This variant of post-war modernism, which emerged from the 1950s to the early 1980s, is characterized by monolithic buildings, unusual geometric shapes, and unfinished surfaces. The style derived its name from "Béton brut", raw or rough concrete, which alludes to its main material. But brick, reinforced steel, glass, and rough stone were also used.

Response to Brutalism was mixed. While many critics and the architectural elite held it in high regard, the general public hated it. Apart from the impression that concrete was ugly and cheap, high-rise Brutalist buildings came to be associated with urban decay, crime, and social deprivation. While the style was widely used for universities. government offices. utilitarian low-cost housing, and shopping centers, the imposing structures eventually feelings evoked

repression, intimidation, authority, hostility for most. These very emotions and impressions made Brutalist buildings the perfect settings for many dystopian and futuristic utopian films. In iconic and acclaimed films like A Clockwork Orange (1971), RoboCop (1987), High Rise(2015), and Blade Runner 2049 (2017), these commanding structures set the mood and visual impact for the entire narrative. More backgrounds than iust obscure forgettable settings, the buildings themselves play symbolic roles that heighten the conflicts depicted in the story.

The concrete and metal forms emphasize futurism and perception of authority. This is particularly seen in how RoboCop used J. Edgar Hoover Building and Dallas City Hall to invoke a sense of control and governance.



The use of brutalist architecture in A Clockwork Orange and Blade Runner 2049 cover the emotional conflicts of their protagonists. The ominous building echoes feelings of Alex DeLarge (Malcolm Dowell) being trapped and horrified. In Blade Runner 2049, the brutalist-inspired Stelline Laboratories mirrors the the hefty weight of Officer K's discovery in the Memory Facility scene.

High Rise, in which the building is more than just a backdrop, but symbolizes societal structure and the "brutality" that arises from this system. The poor residents live on the lower floors, while wealthier individuals with respectable professions like Tom Hiddleston's Dr. Robert Laing take the higher floors. In fact, architecture is the film's central to plot. with the monolithic **buildings** serving as the embodiment of chic modern living, realized through the visions of an esteemed architect.

Brutalist Architecture is a very controversial topic and has been linked to various political ideologies and associations, as well as the authoritarian views that were tangibly formed in the popular culture, with many structures used in dystopian films and graphic novels. As a result, many people tend to have a negative view against the Brutalist structure due to it being massive, ugly, resembling a fortress; and they perceive them as an oppressor. So, it is commonly used in dystopic films to multiply the feeling of ease and discomfort.

MUSIC AND ART:

the power of the music video (5)



It isn't hard to grasp how music and art are so closely related and intertwined with each other. Apart from music being an art form itself, it is also inextricably linked to the visual arts. This is even more the case in todays music industry, where it is almost a necessity for an artist to release a music video, have a photoshoot and create a visual reference to accompany their music. These days, a musicians career can only take off by promoting their music on social media platforms, using every form of visuals to attract an audience and make more people be able to connect with their music. Today's artists are lucky to be presented with such attainable opportunities to add a visual extension to their music. Because of this, we are able to see countless music videos that we can almost sort into genres like film because of their amount and diversity.



Although the importance of music videos and visuals for music has evidently increased over the past decades, the visual arts have continuously played an important role in the passing of music from the artist, to the world. Visuals have always been crucial in not only letting the artist reflect their art in a tangible and more accessible manner, but also in giving them more freedom to showcase their artistic individuality and expand the world they have created with their music. It is understood that music videos are necessary for the satisfaction of the viewers, but also of the artists. With music videos they have the ability to reflect their artistry on a bigger scale and also appeal to many more people. Many artists have changed the way we define music videos today. From musical shorts, to The Beatles, to MTV, music videos have not only undergone change themselves, but have also helped the way we associate music with visuals and the stories they tell. Let's take a look at the history of music videos and artists who have established our definition of them today.

VIDEO: THE BEATLES

One of the very first examples of a "music video" though not with the same purpose, was produced in the 1920's and 30's when silent films were starting to fail and sound was beginning to incorporated into films. Musical performances that weren't live started to become watchable in movie theaters by the audio being in sync with the visuals for the first time. This technology was also used for "talkies" which were films with sound. Even if these are technically the first videos with music, the first videos we can count as actual music videos would be of The Beatles. With the rise of pop culture and growth of broadcast television in the 60's, these sound and visual technologies were seen as an opportunity to promote artists' music. The Beatles can be said to be one of the first bands to use the power of film making to not only promote their records, but also express themselves and their artistry.

The Beatles are also thought to be the inventors of the first visual album, where an artist puts out a music video for each of their songs, to draw more attention to their music. Apart from this, they made 5 feature films that all promoted their upcoming albums and their concepts. Their first feature film and visual album "A Hard Day's Night" follows the four band members in a fictionalized plot who play numerous hit songs throughout the film. This is an important feature film in pioneering the conceptual music video format and introducing new film techniques to music videos. These films were pivotal in creating a new way to promote and express music and also reach a bigger audience. All of the Beatles' music styles and genres are reflected throughout 5 of their feature films and are all accompanied by light hearted scenarios.




The Beatles behind the scenes of the first music video broadcast on television: "We Can Work It

It can be easily said that The Beatles' music videos were essential in setting the first examples of the modern music video. Their first music video, also being the first ever music video to be broadcast on television, shared the four band members pretending to perform their song as the track was dubbed over the video. As the years progressed, The Beatles started to express their artistic styles throughout their music videos. Their music videos "Strawberry Fields Forever" and "Penny Lane" took the promotional music-film format to a new level. They used film techniques from underground and avant-garde movies such as reversed film and slow motion, dramatic lighting, unusual camera angles, and color filtering added in post-production to help reflect the feel of the songs. The psychedelic sound and fashion sense they had back in their "experimental stage" where they experimented with various music styles, (which also influenced their clothing) were showcased thanks to these music videos. This can be seen as one of the first examples of music videos helping to amplify the characteristics of an artists' music.



THE PRE-MTV ERA: THE DIFFERENTIATION OF MUSIC VIDEOS

In 1979, we meet one of the most important concept albums which later became a feature film: "The Wall" by the progressive rock band Pink Floyd. The album is classified as a "rock opera" album because of it being a collection of rock songs relating to a common story. The album explores the abandonment and isolation of a fictionalized rock star Pink inspired by two of the band members. The album describes Pink's childhood trauma from his abusive teachers to his addiction problems when he's an adult. His continuous self-isolation is symbolized by "The Wall" he builds around himself. The most famous track of the album "Another Brick in The Wall" is about when Pink remembers the torment he went through as a child at school. The repetitive lyrics in the chorus describing himself and everyone as "another brick in the wall" suggests the lack of individuality and personalization in society, and especially in children's education. The music video made for the track was partly animation. It showed a villainous teacher sticking students through a meat grinder in the shape of a school. In spite of its darkness, it helped convey the message the band had conceptualized in the song.



Throughout the 70's, more innovative and experimental musicians started exploring the possibilities of what film and music could create together. Differing from the 60's, the 70's is when different musicians of different genres staredt implementing more of their genres and styles onto their music videos, leading to diversity within the music video of world.

In 1982 when the movie featuring the songs and following the story of the album came out, a new music video of the same song now containing scenes of the movie was put out. In this music video viewers watch an authoritarian teacher abusing and oppressing children. Later, we see students wearing identical masks, walking out of a factory almost mindlessly, into and a meat grinder. This scene is not only tremendously more impactful than the previous music video, but it also creates a massive effect on anyone who watches it.

It does an excellent job in conveying the band's message which is how society and governments treat students nothing more than products produced in a factory line (their thought!). The voices of the kids in the song enhanced by the visuals telling the story, perfectly created the world the artists had imagined. With its dark, bothersome and controversial scenes, the video and the whole album proved how disturbance and art can coexist, and just how much impact a video can add onto the music.

their songs. Perhaps the best example of this is the 1975 music video "Bohemian Rhapsody" of the rock band Queen. Though released 7 years before MTV, it is considered by many to have invented the concepts MTV had brought forth. This is because it is seen as the first worldwide single for which its accompanying music video played a central role in it's marketing. While the song was ruling the No.1 charts, for the first time, the video was also shaping the public memory of the song. The shots and visuals accompanying the changing melodies of the song and overall creating an operatic atmosphere is only part of why the music video became so impactful. In a section of their video, Queen do the same pose they had done for their album cover "Queen 2", almost making their cover come to life. This becomes a new and thrilling thing to see for an audience unfamiliar with pop dramatizations. Not to mention the section in the video where visual effects are used to fade lead singer Freddy Mercury in, and drummer Roger Taylor out as they exchange singing the word "Galileo" in different pitches. This helps create a dynamic call-and-response scene between the two of them and entertain the audience tremendously.



The dramatic changes between shots created using video feedback, and the memorable kaleidoscope scene created by holding a prism in front of the lens all contributed to the video's theatricality and widespread impact. Still considered to be perhaps the most iconic music video ever, "Bohemian Rhapsody", along with kick-starting the promotional music video wave, had also created a new golden standard of music videos which most artists are still trying to live up to.



Artists' of other genres were also using the power of music videos to reflect their own artistic style. British art rock/pop legend David Bowie, who had been in the music scene for quite a while, and new up an coming 18 year old Kate Bush were creating never before seen music videos. Kate Bush's debut solo "Wuthering Heights" instantly introduced her music and style as eclectic, individualistic and evocative. The music video of the song is especially important for being before the MTV era, and being simple yet captivating. The music video for the art-pop song featured her in the first of her many well-known gowns, dancing theatrically to create a dream like atmosphere to accompany the dreamlike song. In this music video which is Bush's first ever, she delivers an authentic, truly unique performance that immediately sets her aside from all of the punkrock bands which were ruling the late 70's. It can easily be said that Kate Bush, while never conforming to the conventional music standards of the time, also created a signature music video format filled with gowns, contemporary dancing and enrapturing facial expressions that truly reflected her eccentricity. Her being a genre bending, unconventional musician who used her music videos to reflect that authenticity with visuals, has made her the timeless and memorable icon she is.

Even though David Bowie had made several music videos showing off his distinctive style and space-pop/rock genre throughout the years, the music video for "Ashes to Ashes" was critical in many aspects. It was not only important in giving closure to his most momentous decade which was the 70's, but also in putting him ahead of the curb by using futuristic and other worldly elements to look back on Bowie's struggles and old artistic personas. Him referencing his old personas in the song and changing costumes from an astronaut, a clown, to an asylum inmate showcase his history as an artist and how he's closing a chapter of his career. Throughout the video, newer technologies of the time which cut between various color enhancements are used to make the sky black and the sea pink. This adds to the fantasy aspect of the song. Bowie also wears avant-garde clothing and a full face of makeup to complete the futuristic look. The video is considered one of his personal bests, and has hugely popularized and helped the song itself to be considered one of the most iconic songs of the 80's. It being the most expensive music video ever made for its time shows us how committed and detail-oriented Bowie was in his videos. Released a year before MTV, it had proved that music videos were viable promotional investments and how they can hugely impact a song's popularity. David Bowie's music videos and especially "Ashes to Ashes", which started off the decade when everything about music videos changed, showed the power of an enrapturing, charming, conceptual music video. It is considered a stepping stone to the path of more deeper, meaningful music videos.

By airing this song and its music video as its first, MTV predicted it's impact it had on the music industry. As MTV immediately television, the music video started to gain nation-wide exposure and value. Music videos and visuals started to become one of the main factors in an artist gaining rose to fame . Now, an artist not only had to sound good, but also look good. Because of this, the rise of MTV is seen as a turning point for how music is accessed and perceived. MTV hugely contributed to the visual arts playing a role in the making of videos that aligned with the era's common genre of synth-pop, (with the help of captured the 80's pop scene in her music video of "Girls Just Wanna Have Fun" was one of MTVs first breakout stars. She created a fun, colorful and energetic atmosphere in her most well-known music video by wearing bright and vibrant clothes, and dancing freely to go along with her lively pop sound. Her music video can still be thought of as the perfect feel-good 80's music video.

The MTV era was a time for artists to let their imagination and creativity run wild. In this era, musicians and directors started to explore the possibilities of what could be done in a music video. Music videos were created by using more sophisticated effects and by adding a plot or a story to the music video. Artists like a-ha and Peter Gabriel were pushing the limits of modern technology and creating state of the art music videos. Gabriel used three animation styles; claymotion, pixelation and stop motion to create his "Sledgehammer" music video while a-ha's "Take On Me" music video featured a live action pencil sketch sequence. Both of these songs originally gained success because of the wide exposure their radical music videos had on MTV.

One of the most important and visual albums and soundtrack ever, "Purple Rain" by Prince was also released in this era. The feature film accompanying Prince's songs from his album was made to reflect the story of the album. The movie, that illustrated Prince's euphoric pop style while telling the story of a struggling artist, helped complete the visual and auditory experience of the album and set Prince aside as a potential pop legend. The album was another big push that made visuals so important in the 80's.




